They were also to eat unleavened bread (bread without a raising agent) Why? Exodus 12:39 might give a clue.

God’s institution of the Passover was a very important event for the Israelites. They were to keep this ceremony every year at the same time, as a reminder of God’s deliverance from their time in slavery. The details of the Passover were also significant, as they became a TYPE or picture that was fulfilled in Jesus as the ANTITYPE. Jesus became the Lamb who was sacrificed and shed His blood for us to free us from our slavery to sin.
